



Dianella tasmanica

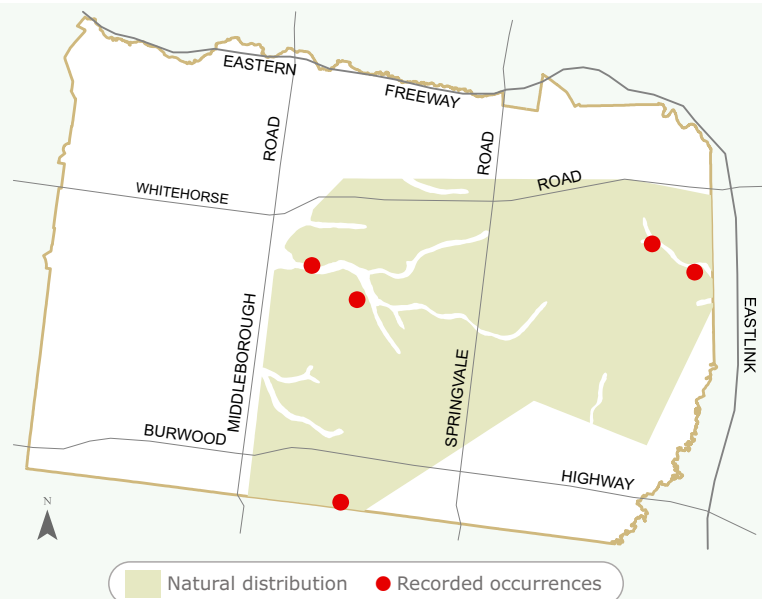
Tasman Flax-lily

Height:	0.6m - 1.5m
Width:	0.5m - 2m
Habit:	Tufted perennial herb, usually a clump but may spread vigorously from strong underground stems.
Foliage:	Broad dark-green erect strap-like leaves up to 1m long x 4cm wide.
Flowers:	Clusters of blue to violet flowers with yellow anthers on strong multi-branched stems to 1.5m high. Flowers from August to February, followed by large blue to purple berries.
Requirements:	Prefers moist soils and a cool shaded area but is adaptable to its surroundings. Shade or partial sun.
Cultivation & uses:	A hardy and versatile plant, that can be planted under existing trees and is effective in mass plantings. Spreads less vigorously in drier conditions. Leaves may burn if in full sun. An attractive addition to gardens, drought tolerant.

Local Distribution:

Map is indicative to the natural distribution of the species based on the best available knowledge.

The natural occurrence of this species is infrequent.
