



Eucalyptus baxteri

Brown Stringybark

Height:	10m - 25m
Width:	4m - 15m
Habit:	Variable tree with a rounded crown and rough bark. Stringy, persistent red-brown to grey bark throughout, except for the smallest of branches.
Foliage:	Juvenile leaves - pale green, egg-shaped with wavy edges up to 7cm long x 5cm wide. Intermediate leaves - larger up to 13cm long x 8cm wide. Adult leaves - glossy green, thick, broad, lance-shaped up to 15cm long x 3cm wide.
Flowers:	Clusters of buds with rough caps and profuse white or cream flowers from December to April.
Requirements:	Well drained soils. Full or partial sun.
Cultivation & uses:	Generally a medium sized tree, varying from a single-stemmed upright tree to a smaller multi-stemmed tree, depending on situation. Useful as a shade tree or a shelter tree.

Local Distribution:

Map is indicative to the natural distribution of the species based on the best available knowledge.

The natural occurrence of this species is infrequent.

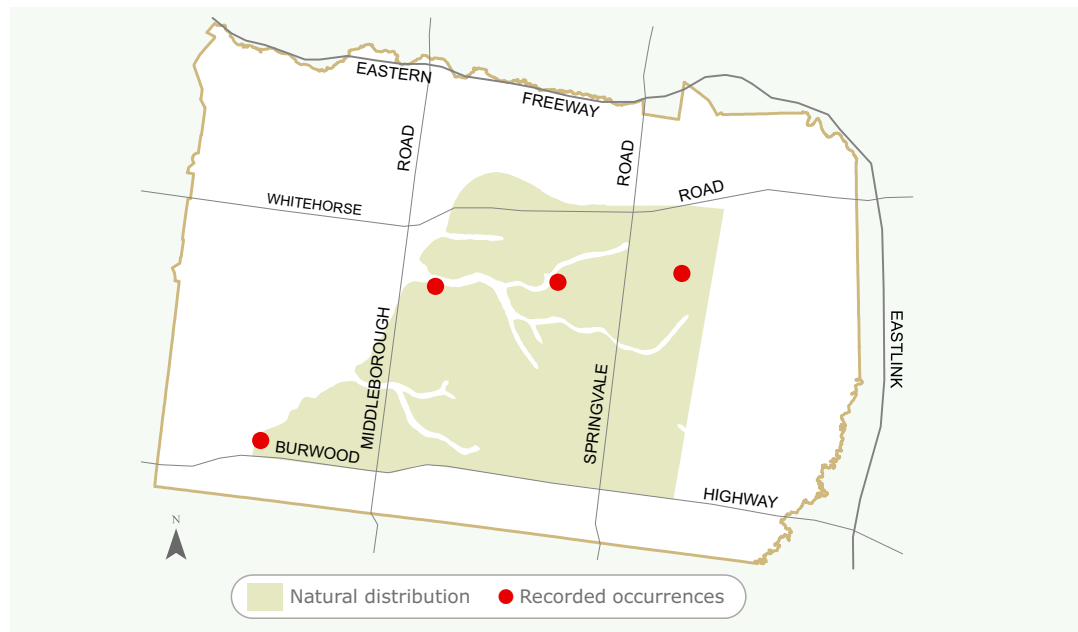
